2013 HISTORIC PROPERTY GRANT PROGRAM AWARDS



St. Joseph's Chapel, Beltsville
\$48,507

Built in 1880, St. Joseph's Chapel was established by the Christian Brothers on the grounds of the Ammendale Normal Institute. The chapel was given to the Holy Apostles in 2009, a condition of the gift being that this historic site and National Register property would be restored as a place of worship. Grant funds will be used for an overall restoration and rehabilitation of the exterior.



Perkins Chapel, Glenn Dale
\$34,574

Built c. 1861, this historic site is one of the few surviving mid-19th century rural chapels in the county. It is now owned by the Glenn Dale UMC, formed more than 40 years ago from the predominantly black congregation of Dorsey Chapel, and the predominantly white congregation of Perkins. Grant funds will be used for an overall exterior restoration and rehabilitation.



Hitching Post Hill, Hyattsville
\$39,461

Hitching Post Hill, which is individually listed in the National Register of Historic Places and is also a historic site, was built in 1840, and is a unique example of a large Greek Revival house in the county. Presidents Cleveland and Grant were entertained there. Grant funds will be used to repair damages to the masonry incurred in the 2011 earthquake.



Wilson-Gleis House, Riverdale Park
\$31,150

Built c. 1889 by Dr. William Wilson, this Queen-Anne style house was later sold to the Gleis family who owned it for 90 years. Damaged by fire in 2011, grant funds will be used to help restore the porch of this historic site, which is also a contributing property to the Riverdale Park National Register District.



Peter Randall House, North Brentwood
\$6,523

Built in 1893, the Peter Randall House is the oldest surviving dwelling in North Brentwood. It contributes to the North Brentwood National Register District and is also a historic site. The grant funds will be used to install a new roof.



St. Barnabas' Church, Temple Hills

\$48,506

St. Barnabas was built in 1851 as a mission chapel for St. John's Episcopal Church at Broad Creek, to replace the original 1830 building. It was listed as a historic site in 1981. Grant funds will be used to help pay for an overall exterior restoration, including the roof, window and masonry work.



Compton Bassett Tobacco Barn, Upper Marlboro

\$5,267

Constructed circa 1835, this barn was originally associated with the Compton Bassett estate across the road. The intact condition of the barn tells the unique story of 19th- and 20th-century tobacco farming in the county; it is eligible to be listed as a historic site. Although the barn is intact and partially restored, grant funds will be used to complete the restoration.



Chapel of the Incarnation, Brandywine

\$3,797

Listed individually in the National Register and built in 1916, the Chapel of the Incarnation is a unique example in the county of Spanish mission style church architecture. It was built as a mission chapel for St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in Croom and is also a historic site. Grant funds will be used to complete restoration of the windows.



St. Thomas' Episcopal Church, Croom

\$3,640

Listed in the National Register of Historic Places and designated as a historic site, St. Thomas' Church was built c. 1745 and was embellished with Victorian additions in 1888. The grant funds will be used to repair the roof of the sacristy and refurbish stained glass windows there and in the bell tower.



Croome Settlement School, Croom

\$23,125

This dwelling, constructed 1905, once served as the principal building of the Croome Settlement School. For more than 20 years the school prepared African-American youth for the working world, until it closed in 1952. Grant funds will be used to replace later windows, restore the clapboards, and correct the foundation, which is settling. This historic site is also a contributing building within the St. Thomas' Episcopal Church National Register Historic District.
