- c) <u>Consumer Driven Health Plan Presentation (CDHP) (AON/Spencer/McDonald)</u> Health and Benefits Manager Jennifer McDonald, explained that many employers, public and private, are looking at CDHP, also known as "high deductible" health plans as an option for employers to achieve cost savings. She indicated that the option was being presented as the agency attempts to mitigate the impending Cadillac Tax. This tax is scheduled to go into effect in June 2020. Ms. McDonald stated employers are looking for strategies that will allow them to continue to offer a comprehensive and affordable benefits package, while mitigating the effect of the tax. Ms. McDonald introduced AON Hewitt Consulting Vice-President Kathleen McAuliffe, and Assistant Vice-President Meggan Ballard, who reviewed the CDHP presentation as contained in item 5c of the packet.

Ms. McAuliffe provided an overview of CDHP, and reviewed an example of a CDHP design, which utilized employer and employee contributions that could then be used to cover deductibles and other costs. Ms. McAuliffe explained that the plan design encourages employees to be more conscious about making choices that will reduce health care expenses. She explained that the design encourages employees to become more actively involved in managing health care by giving employees a financial stake in lowering their health care costs through the use of a high deductible plan coupled with an account based medical plan.

The Commissioners communicated the presentation did not provide sufficient information on the need to move to the CDHP, or the impact of the Cadillac Tax, its structure and triggers. The Commissioners specifically requested more data on employers who have used CDHPs versus other incentives used to reduce costs.

Chair Anderson and Vice-Chair Hewlett indicated they did not find the presentation persuasive in explaining cost savings from the new design versus savings that can be achieved in current plans. Chair Anderson suggested that consideration be given on cost savings measures within existing plans and that AON provide data from this review.

He suggested consideration including changes in co-pays, greater distinction in benefits for in-network and out-of-network doctors, and other managed care approaches. Vice-Chair Hewlett stated she was concerned with the high deductible plan design as this may be challenging for many employees.

Executive Director Barney helped clarify the Cadillac Tax which will be implemented in 2020 under the mandates of the Affordable Care Act. She explained businesses will have to reduce costs on medical programs, because if the programs are too generous, they will be subject to the Tax. The CDHP is one cost savings option that is being considered by employers. Based on the Commissioners' input, staff will continue to look into other cost savings measures. Neither Montgomery County nor Prince George's County governments have implemented the CDHP at this time.

The Commissioners asked that in future presentations, information be provided on industry trends (public and private sector), and the types of options companies are moving towards. The Commissioners' questions and comments will be considered as the time approaches to make design changes. Ms. McDonald has a meeting next week with AON to discuss designing options so the M-NCPPC will have a basic option, a modern option, and a high option.

5d) <u>Personnel Management Review (PMR) FY15 Summary Report (Spencer/King/Peoples)</u> Human Resources Director William Spencer introduced Classification and Compensation Manager Boni King and Senior Human Resources Specialist Derrick Peoples, who prepared the annual Personnel Management Review (PMR) Summary for FY2015. Mr. Peoples presented the report stating that the PMR provides selected trends and highlights regarding the Commission's workforce to include employee demographics, turnover, recruitment fill times, hires and promotions, as well as pay grade and salary information, among other related items.

Commissioners stated that use of the term "disparity" may be perceived as implying discrimination when that was not the intended use in the report. The report was presenting improvement related to differences in average salaries.

e) Literacy and Language Proficiency Program Briefing (Bennett)

Corporate Policy and Management Operations Chief Anju Bennett introduced Literacy Program Manager Shelley Gaylord and Senior Management Analyst Lisa Dupree, and thanked them for their contributions to the research and design of the Literacy and Language Proficiency Program.

Chief Anju Bennett provided background on the development of the program crediting support from the Commissioners and Department Heads. Ms. Bennett explained the Program builds upon the success of earlier literacy instruction, with enhancements for a sustainable program that meets operational and employee needs. The M-NCPPC partnered with the Montgomery County Literacy Council as it specializes in workforce training and meets all operational concerns identified by the agency. The Program which was launched in fall, offers four courses for native English speakers and individuals who speak English as a second language.

The program has been very well received, with higher than expected interest. Ms. Bennett credited the support from supervisors, and the robust marketing of the program. She thanked Commissioners, Directors, CPMO staff, and field managers who spoke at the forums to share information and encourage participation. Thirty-nine students are presently enrolled in the program.

The Program will be assessed at the conclusion of the fall/spring term to ensure that it remains successful. A midpoint survey and classroom observations have already taken place to ensure instruction is effective for current participants. Ms. Bennett reviewed feedback provided by employees, indicating that employees are pleased with the program and are highly motivated. Some feedback resulted in positive changes to the program.

A graduation ceremony will be held after the Commission meeting in June.

Commissioners thanked the team for implementing the program. The Executive Director Barney thanked the team for an excellent job.

	c. Proposed Policy Amendments: (Bennett/Dupree) Corporate Policy and Management Operations Chief Bennett presented
	proposed amendments to two policies. She explained that the policy is being
	reviewed as part of a larger review of workplace ethics standards.
	1. Practice 2-14, Outside Employment & Non-Commission Business
	Ms. Bennett explained this policy protects the agency from conflicts of
	interest that may arise from an employee's participation in outside
	employment and in certain Non-Commission business activities. The policy
	defines conditions that must be met to avoid conflicts of interest, and
	establishes requirements to disclose and receive prior authorization to participate in certain activities.
	Practice 2-14 has undergone several updates. In the last update,
	Commissioners asked that the policy be amended to require employees to
	disclose and receive approval for all outside employment situations, so
	management could determine if the outside employment posed any conflict
	of interest. On the separate issue of <u>Non-Commission business</u> , the policy
	presently prohibits employees from performing (personal business or
	business involving a third party) during any period in which they were
	expected to carry out M-NCPPC duties. Ms. Bennett explained the policy
	applies to Department Heads and employees. The policy does not apply to
	Commissioners as they are covered by State ethics statutes. While most
	provisions of the policy apply to collective bargaining members, some areas
	are specifically addressed in the collective bargaining agreements, which prevail.
	The recent policy proposals address operational and implementation
	challenges identified with Department Heads. Non-represented employees
	and Union representatives were provided an opportunity to comment. Som
	changes also stem from Audit Committee recommendations.

Ms. Bennett walked the Executive Committee through the more significant policy amendments contained in the meeting packet. Areas on which there were comments/suggestions by the Executive Committee, are noted below.
Use of Uniforms when performing outside jobs: One proposed amendment addresses the use of uniforms. The change states employees are not to wear M-NCPPC uniforms or other M-NCPPC insignia while performing outside jobs, unless authorization is obtained by the M-NCPPC. A reference will be added for use of Uniforms as permitted under collective bargaining agreements.
 <u>I: Outside Employment</u>: – this area pertains to participation in any business or non-profit entity involving fiduciary responsibilities in a position such as an officer, manager, or director. It was amended to: Recognize board member positions as well as other leadership positions. Clarify that positions may be compensated or uncompensated Exclude from disclosure requirements, military service and official activities in a union representing the M-NCPPC employee.
The Executive Committee discussed the disclosure of compensated and non- compensated outside employment. A decision was made to relook at whether outside employment should strictly refer to compensated work. There was agreement that the policy should continue to request disclosure of positions with fiduciary responsibilities. Chair Anderson stated that the expansion of outside employment to include "leadership" may be too ambiguous. General Counsel Gardner explained he had made the suggestion to add leadership roles, as fiduciary roles were limited in scope. However, this area would be reconsidered.
In response to Chair Anderson's inquiry about disclosure of political activities, Ms. Bennett explained that participation in political activities are permitted and addressed in a separate policy. She will add language which informs employees that political activities should be handled in accordance with the referenced policy, rather than under Practice 2-14.
 <u>II. Non-Commission Business</u> : Under the existing policy, Non Commission business is presently identified as activities of a personal nature, third party business, or work performed as a volunteer or representative of an association. The policy presently prohibits the performance of any Non- Commission business while an employee is carrying out his M-NCPPC duties. The policy does not address off duty participation.
 The Audit Committee suggested: Expanding the definition of Non-Commission business to recognize being a volunteer and representative in external organizations such as foundations, non-profit or charitable entities, civic associations, etc. Requiring disclosure of outside business as it could result in a conflict of interest with the performance of M-NCPPC duties. The Audit Committee

also recognized there may be some instances in which participation is beneficial to the M-NCPPC.
Ms. Bennett explained that this area of the policy generated the greatest input from Department Heads, the General Counsel and Labor Counsel. There was support for incorporating the Audit Committee's recommendations. Management/Counsel also recommended limited disclosure of Non-Commission business, as requiring disclosure of all activities would be difficult and viewed as overly intrusive. Therefore policy proposals require disclosure and authorization of those activities which could pose conflicts-of-interest. The policy makes a distinction in Non- Commission business that is being performed as an extension of the employee's duties (on duty participation) versus Non-Commission business that is performed outside of work (off duty participation).
<u>On duty participation</u> —The proposed amendments require disclosure and authorization of participation in outside entities (e.g. foundations, associations, etc.) when this participation is related to the employee's M-NCPPC duties.
Vice Chair Hewlett inquired if it was necessary to require disclosure of Non- Commission business, which is clearly related to the employee's position and has already been assigned by Department Heads (for example, assigned to a foundation). Ms. Bennett explained required disclosure was recommended by Department Heads. General Counsel Gardner explained that disclosure triggers review of the assignment against conditions outlined in the Practice.
Off Duty Participation in Non-Commission Business: The proposed amendments state off duty activities do not need to be disclosed, unless there is a potential for conflict. The policy provides examples of situations which necessitate disclosure. Once disclosed Department Heads review the activity against conditions established in the policy. These conditions describe conflicts that should be avoided.
The Executive Committee and Department Heads expressed support for required disclosure of activities which pose a potential conflict-of-interest. Montgomery County Planning Director Wright inquired whether the agency should be taking on the role of authorizing participation in outside business activities. Following discussion of this item, the Executive Committee suggested the policy be further amended to clarify that disclosure and review of the activities does not imply endorsement or authorization of activities.
CPMO Chief Bennett will review the policy with regard to recommendations made today. Ms. Bennett will work with General Counsel Gardner, who will follow up with Labor Counsel Ballew on any collective bargaining implications. Although she will try to get work completed by the upcoming week, the reviews from legal counsel may require additional time. Executive Director Barney stated that if the Practice is not ready for the May Commission meeting, it will be presented in June with Practice 3-10.

	Chair Anderson suggested an explanatory chart/synopsis be included during
	the policy presentation. General Counsel complimented Ms. Bennett on her work with Department Heads in isolating issues that should be considered.
	 Practice 2-15, Employee use of Commission Property (Bennett/Dupree) CPMO Chief Bennett reviewed proposed amendments which authorize use of agency resources, and circumstances in which use was limited. She explained that the policy serves as the umbrella policy, while more specific or complementary guidance is needed on specific topics (e.g. vehicle use policy, use of facilities, etc). The policy includes updates to recognize intellectual property, natural resources, and newer technology.

Gregory M. Stump and Sunita Bhatia presented the Actuarial Assumption Review and Experience Study (the "Study"). The Study reviewed the actual experience with the actuarial assumptions of the ERS' economic and demographic experience over a five-year period ending June 30, 2015. The economic assumptions include inflation, wage growth and salary increases, investment return and retiree cost-of-living adjustments. These assumptions are interconnected and based on long-term expectations. The national trend has been a decrease in each of these assumptions. The demographic assumptions include mortality/life expectancy, observed rates of retirement, withdrawal, termination, disability and death.

Boomershine Consulting Group is recommending the following assumption changes:

The immediate impact on the funding and contributions are as follows:

- A decrease of 2.6% in the funding ratio associated with the increase in actuarial accrued liability of \$25.5 million.
- An increase in the normal cost of about \$2.1 million.
- An increase in the annual employer contribution of approximately \$3.6 million per year.

MS. BARNEY made a motion, seconded by MS. GOGOL to approve Boomershine Consulting Group's recommendations as outlined in their Actuarial Assumption Review and Experience Study dated April 2016. The motions PASSED unanimously (7-0). (Motion #16-18)

Ms. Rose recommended the Board approve a 0.1% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for retirees and beneficiaries effective July 1, 2016. Staff calculated the COLA using data from Table 24 - All Urban Consumers (CPI U) - All Items Annual Average (at December 2014). All retirees and beneficiaries receiving annuities for at least six months are eligible for the COLA.

MS. BARNEY made a motion, seconded by MS. WALSH to approve a 0.1% Cost-of-Living Adjustment Effective July 1, 2016 for Eligible Retirees and Beneficiaries in Accordance with Provisions of the Employees' Retirement System. The motion PASSED unanimously (7-0). (Motion #16-19)

Ms. Rose reported the Employees' Retirement System was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2015. Sheila Joynes, Accounting Manager, was recognized for leading the CAFR team to another Award in Excellence.

Ms. Rose said the Call for Applications for the Prince George's County Open Trustee seat ended March 25, 2016 at 5:00 p.m. with one application. Alicia Hart, submitted an application for appointment for the Prince

George's County Open Trustee seat. No other applications were received. Ms. Hart is determined to have won by acclamation.

Alicia Hart has been the Administrative Manager (Budget Manager) for Prince George's County Department of Parks & Recreation since 2015. Ms. Hart has a Master's of Business Administration from Strayer University and a Doctors of Business Administration from Walden University. Ms. Hart has held positions in both the private and public sectors in the office administration arena as an Assistant Director, Facilities and Maintenance Coordinator and Account Manager.

MS. WALSH made a motion, seconded by MS. BARNEY to acknowledge Alicia Hart as the Prince George's County Open Trustee for the remainder of the term ending June 30, 2018. The motion PASSED unanimously (7-0). (Motion #16-20)

The Commission's ERP project continues to affect the ERS' work program. ERS Staff met with Executive Director, Patty Barney, this month to discuss problems encountered and how to best move forward.

As a follow-up to a question raised by MS. WALSH at the March 1, 2016 Board Meeting, Ms. Rose presented several graphs showing the geographical location of Commission Retirees, as of December 2015. Ms. Rose highlighted the following points:

- **Retirees Residing in Maryland** 69.2% (942) of all retirees reside in Maryland and 30.8% (420) reside throughout the US and other countries. Seven (7) retirees reside outside the US in Chili, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Israel, South Africa and Spain. \$29.4 million in annual benefit payments remains in Maryland and \$12.0 million is paid outside of Maryland.
- Retirees Residing in Prince George's and Montgomery Counties 39.3% (535) of all retirees reside in Prince George's and Montgomery counties. \$15.7 million in annual benefit payments remains in Prince George's and Montgomery counties.
- Prince George's County vs. Montgomery County 535 retirees reside in Prince George's and Montgomery Counties. 51% (275) reside in Montgomery County and 49% (260) reside in Prince George's County. \$8.5 million in annual benefit payments remain in Montgomery County and \$7.2 million in annual benefit payments remain in Prince George's County.

MS. WALSH presented the regular and updated reports for the Audit Committee meeting of March 14, 2016.

The ERS and Commission issued a joint Request for Proposal (RFP) for Auditing Services with responses due March 1, 2016. Two responses to the RFP were received from incumbent CliftonLarsonAllen and SB & Company, LLC. The Audit Committee reviewed and evaluated the responses of both firms by key personnel, allocation of hours, qualifications and relevant experience, methodology and approach and fees. The SB & Company received marginally higher scores. MS. BARNEY noted they also had great references.

The Audit Committee recommends the Board award the Auditing Services Contract to SB & Company for three years with a two-year renewal option.

MS. BARNEY made a motion, seconded by MR. AFZAL to award the Auditing Services Contract to SB & Company for three years with a two-year renewal option. The motion PASSED unanimously (7-0). (Motion #16-21)

- B. Investment Monitoring Group Committee Presentation by Committee Chairman, Patricia Barney
 - i. Regular Report of March 15, 2016
 - a. Recommendation to Maintain the Current Asset Allocation Policy (51% Equity, 29% Fixed Income and 20% Real Assets) as detailed in the Statement of Investment Policy Approved on February 3, 2015 by the Board of Trustees
 - ii. Confidential Report of March 15, 2016

MS. BARNEY presented the regular report for the Investment Monitoring Group's (IMG) meeting of March 15, 2016.

The IMG met with Loomis Sayles' Todd Needham, CFA, Vice President and Client Portfolio Manager for a performance review of Loomis Sayles' High Yield fund and reviewed Wilshire Associates' Manager Review of the strategy which showed a slight underperformance since inception, June 30, 2006. Loomis is a relative value player making tactical decisions outside of the high yield bond market in investment grade bonds, non-dollar bonds, MBS, preferred bonds, and convertibles. Historically, Loomis does not perform well in down markets. Loomis is confident in outperformance over a market cycle (3-5 years), but admits there will be volatility and the portfolio may trail the index at times. Loomis expects to see slow and steady growth going forward.

The IMG reviewed Wilshire Associates Manager Review for Neuberger Berman High Yield strategy. In contrast to Loomis Sayles, Neuberger Berman is 100% focused on the high yield market and is considered an all-weather strategy with slightly less risk than the Loomis strategy.

Wilshire did not have any concerns about Loomis Sayles' or Neuberger Berman's performance.

As directed by the Board at its March 1, 2016 meeting, the IMG performed an in depth review of Wilshire Associates' Asset Liability Valuation (ALV) Analysis and Summary and discussed the current portfolio allocation, investment risks, 10-year and 30-year capital market assumptions, the recommended alternative portfolios, and the current portfolio's position on the efficient frontier. The IMG could not find a compelling reason to select an alternative portfolio.

The IMG recommends maintaining the current asset allocation policy (51% Equity, 29% Fixed Income and 20% Real Assets) as detailed in the Statement of Investment Policy approved February 3, 2015 by the Board of Trustees.

MS. BARNEY made a motion, seconded by MS. WALSH to approve maintaining the current asset allocation policy (51% Equity, 29% Fixed Income and 20% Real Assets) as detailed in the Statement of Investment Policy approved February 3, 2015 by the Board of Trustees. The motion PASSED unanimously (7-0). (Motion #16-22)

C. Administration & Personnel Oversight Committee MINUTES, AS APPROVED, AT THE REGULAR MAY 3, 2016 BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING Presentation by Committee Chairman, Barbara Walsh

MS. WALSH presented the regular report for the Administration & Personnel Oversight Committee (Personnel Committee) meeting of March 15, 2016.

A Notice to all Prince George's County residents was placed in the *Sentinel*, on the Commission's and ERS' websites, and was forwarded to the Washington Area Investment Forum for distribution inviting residents to apply for the Prince George's County Public Member seat on the ERS Board of Trustees. The call for applications ended at 5:00 p.m. on March 25, 2016 with four (4) applicants.

The Personnel Committee reviewed the four applications and determined one applicant was ineligible due to his current residency in Montgomery County. The Personnel Committee agreed one applicants operations and significant investment experience gave her a slight edge over the other applicants and recommended the Board nominate her as the Prince George's County Public Member for the term ending June 30, 2017 to the Commission, who makes the final appointment.

MS. MILLAR made a motion, seconded by MS. BARNEY to nominate Ms. Sheila Morgan-Johnson as the Prince George's County Public Member for the term ending June 30, 2017. The motion PASSED unanimously (7-0). (Motion #16-23)

The meeting was called to order at 11:00 a.m.

Minutes from the 9/16/15 meeting were approved. Mr. Bryant asked that the performance report be moved from the second agenda item to the fifth agenda item, and the committee concurred.

Mr. Zimmerman discussed the protocol for review of the investment results for the third quarter, and it was agreed to follow the same format as was used in the previous year.

Ms. Rodman presented the proposed real estate contract for Intercontinental, and the side letter prepared by external counsel Groom. She said that the contract was ready for signature. Mr. Bryant added that it would take two quarters to invest the money. Mr. Zimmerman noted that an anticipated July 1, 2016 cash inflow matched almost perfectly the amount needed to fund real estate. Mr. Bryant said that getting the contract signed before the end of the calendar year would provide the best chance of matching those two cash flows.

Mr. Bryant presented a proposal for constructing an investment policy for the fund after reviewing the investment policy for ERS. He said that he would like to present a policy to the board that contains three parts. The first part would outline process, responsibilities, and goals. The second part would provide the outcome of that process including the asset allocation and ranges, means of evaluating managers, and the actuarial assumption. The third part would include guidelines and expectations relative to each investment strategy. Mr. Bryant said he felt that such a structure would make the IPS most useful to all constituencies. After a brief discussion, the Board agreed to allow Mr. Bryant to prepare a draft IPS on that basis for presentation at the next meeting.

Mr. Bryant described the third quarter as being the third worst in six years. He also noted that the new asset allocation designed, as it was, to capture return in up markets performed particularly badly. The portfolio lost 9.6% in a quarter for which the average public fund portfolio lost 5.0%.

During the quarter, domestic stocks declined 7% and foreign stocks declined 12% while domestic fixed income increased 1.2% and foreign fixed income increased 0.5%. Private domestic real estate, as represented by the NCREIF ODCE, increased 3.7%.

The asset allocation did poorly in this environment because of high allocations to domestic mid/small cap equity, emerging market equity, and the low bond allocation. Not having the real estate allocation funded also hurt.

The managers also performed below benchmark. Mr. Bryant noted that all of the strategies had a value tilt and depended on growth to outperform. The third quarter represented a fear – largely unrealized – that the worldwide recovery was in danger of collapse due to slower growth in China. Mr. Bryant concluded the performance report by noting that, with the return of positive psychology in the fourth quarter, the portfolio had gained 4.7% through November.

Mr. Bryant indicated that with the fund's growing size it was time to diversify beyond the PIMCO strategies that are currently being used. He promised to bring options for that to the next meeting.

Mr. Zimmerman noted that the best time to buy assets was when they were shunned by the market and, therefore, cheaper, and that it was important to stick to the long-term plan. Commissioner Geraldo questioned whether now was the right time to commit to foreign equities. Mr. Bryant said that while there were many issues abroad, notably the slowdown in China and the strengthening of the dollar, foreign assets were generally cheap relative to domestic assets. He also said that with the finalization of an asset allocation it was important to stick with that plan and not make intermediate-term tactical changes.

Ms. Barney noted that index funds were an attractive alternative, and that her experience with MNCPPC's large fund demonstrated that making money with active management was extremely difficult.

Mr. Bryant concluded by saying that whatever alternatives the committee chose, the portfolio probably needed to remain simple and easy to administer.

The Trustees set 11:30 am on Wednesday, March 16, 2016 at MRO as the time for the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 pm.

SUBJECT: FY2017 Operating Budget

RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Trustees ("Board") of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission ("Commission") Employees' Retirement System ("ERS") respectfully submits the FY2017 Operating Budget for approval. The budget totals \$1,838,238 which is a 1.8% decrease from the FY2016 Operating Budget.

BACKGROUND

The Commission established the ERS effective July 1, 1972, in accordance with the Trust Agreement between the Commission and the ERS' Board. The Board's primary responsibility is to administer the ERS for the sole benefit of the members in order to pay the promised benefits.

Annually, the Board prepares and presents an operating budget setting forth projected expenditures for the operation of the ERS for the Commission's review and approval. The Board also prepares certain projected expenses, including banking, investment consulting and investment manager fees for the Commission's information. The Board monitors closely the fees and expenses from consultants and professional advisors to ensure comparability to other public funds of the ERS' size and complexity.

Although there is no formal restriction or budget guideline imposed by parties outside the Board, the Board is sensitive to the limitations imposed on the Commission by the two counties. Historically, administrative expenses were equal to 1% of estimated covered payroll and the ERS consistently maintained its budget within this expense assumption. As the Commission payroll was reduced through management restructuring, the amount available for budget consideration using the 1% expense assumption decreased as work program requirements increased making it difficult to effectively manage the ERS' work program. After considerable analysis, at its February 5, 2013 meeting, the Board approved an operating budget each year based exclusively on the ERS' fiscal work program requirements which is consistent with other local retirement systems.

ANALYSIS

The Board examined each expenditure category and its funding. The FY2017 Operating Budget (Attachment 1) proposes overall spending at \$1,838,238 based on the work program requirements reflected below. The FY2017 Operating Budget is a decrease of 1.8% in spending from FY2016.

Personnel Services

Personnel Services are expected to decrease 1.7% from FY2016 and include a placeholder for salary adjustments, pension, health and OPEB. The employer pension contribution decreased significantly from 18.5% in FY2016 to 13% in FY2017 for the defined benefit plan and remains flat at 8% in the ICMA 401(a) plan. Two employees will hit the top-of-grade this fiscal year and one employee has been at top-of-grade since 2003.

Other Services & Charges

This category nets to an overall decrease of 2.4% and includes professional services (actuarial, auditing, and legal); education and training; insurance (fiduciary, general liability and a fidelity bond); and miscellaneous services (printing, rent, copier and software maintenance fees).

Actuarial Services are estimated at \$64,170 (a decrease of 13.7% from FY2016) and includes funding for the annual actuarial valuation, data accommodations, actuarial deficiency calculations, an actuarial equivalence factor review, board and staff training, annual review of the investment assumption, and the GASB 67 & 68 report.

Auditing & Tax Consulting is projected at \$31,050 (a 15.7% decrease from FY2016) and includes the annual audit, review of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, tax advice related to the ERS' alternative investments and assistance in navigating the filing and disclosure requirements for the ERS' international investments, including the review of all K-1s. A decrease in fees resulted from selection of a new auditor following the issuance of a Request for Proposal.

Legal Services for outside pension counsel are projected at \$145,000 (the same amount proposed in FY2016) and includes issues related to the new and existing alternative investment structures, plan member issues, and maintenance of the ERS' tax gualified

status. The robust funding for outside counsel is required for the specialized services applicable to public pension plans.

Computer Consulting is projected at \$22,500 and includes a required Oracle upgrade and modifications to the interface between the ERS and the Commission.

Education & Training for the board and staff is important to maintain the highest standards of fiduciary accountability. Trustees are required to complete eight hours of investment and fiduciary training each year and to attend at least one educational conference every other year that will enable trustees to perform their fiduciary duties. Total training for staff and trustees is budgeted at \$34,500 which is a 9.5% increase from FY2016. The increase includes custom in-house training for the ERS staff on qualification and taxation issues for governmental retirement plans.

The ERS reimburses the Commission for rent which remains flat at the FY2016 level of \$96,015.

Chargebacks, Capital Outlay & Additional Information

In July 2005, ERS technology operations were integrated with the CAS-IT Department in an effort to establish cross training, back up and enhanced services for the ERS and CAS-IT. The ERS reimburses Finance through a chargeback for these services in an amount of \$47,200. The Board continues to maintain Commission standards for hardware, software, security and access control provided funds are available.

The Commission's General Counsel's Office provides legal services to the ERS in the areas of contract review and negotiation, litigation oversight, employee issues and general plan advice. The chargeback is \$64,200 for these services.

The ERS maintains Commission standards for hardware; however, no Capital Outlay is anticipated for FY2017.

Staff delayed the search for a new pension software solution in FY2016 as a result of the challenges with the Commission's ERP project. Ideally, the RFP will be issued in FY2017 with project implementation in FY2018.

Investment Services

Attachment 2 estimates fees for bank custodial services provided by The Northern Trust Company of Chicago, Illinois; investment consulting services provided by Wilshire Associates of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; and investment management services provided by investment managers investing in domestic equities, international equities, fixed income, alternatives, real estate and high yield income. Investment manager fees fluctuate based on the market value of the portfolio.

<u>Action</u>

The Administration Fund for the Department of Human Resources and Management (DHRM) is projected to have some savings in personnel costs primarily from unanticipated salary lapse and benefits savings in FY16. We have approximately \$194,000 in savings. We are requesting approval of a budget transfer for a portion of these savings to enable us to address additional or ongoing critical needs which were not known during the FY16 budget process. The requested use of salary lapse is in the amount of \$160,000.

Proposed Use of Lapse/Savings

We are requesting to use funds as follows:

- <u>New Utility Van for Archive Program</u> \$25,000 The program requires a daily use of the utility van to transport records to and from operating departments. The existing van is over 20 years old and in very poor mechanical condition. Fleet Management recommended replacing the vehicle. Fleet Management was asked about used replacement vehicles, however none are available.
- <u>Enterprise Resource Program</u> \$135,000 We are requesting to use a portion of the salary lapse toward implementation of ERP modules through systems consulting services, programming enhancements, and training.

ACTION REQUESTED:

No action is requested at this time. Boomershine Consulting will be making a presentation to the Commission in response to a Commissioner request to provide information regarding defined contribution plans.

BACKGROUND:

The Commission's actuary Boomershine Consulting will be providing an educational briefing on defined contribution plans per a request from one of our Commissioners. The presentation will include a comparison of three types of pension plans: defined benefit, defined contribution plan and hybrid.

As you may recall, during FY 12 as result of the difficult financial environment, the Commission evaluated various options to bend the cost curve related to our compensation and benefit plans. As part of that effort, a comprehensive study was performed regarding the three different types of pension plans. This major effort resulted in the Commission decision to offer new hires a lower cost defined benefit pension plan beginning in January of 2013. The cost of that new plan was to be approximately the same as the "GRIP" plan offered by Montgomery County Government which at that time was estimated to be 7% of payroll. To date, the cost of our new plan has been approximately 7% of payroll and about 15% of our employees are now in the new Plan E.
