him for his service and wonderful work. Mr. Glazier was being recommended to the position
and Chair Anderson believes he will do a fantastic job with advocating for biking and
pedestrian infrastructure and safety.

c) <u>PowerPoint Presentation on the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for Fiscal</u> Year End June 30, 2019 (Zimmerman/Rodman/Lehman):

Secretary-Treasurer Zimmerman introduced Mr. Chris Lehman of the audit firm, SB & Co., and Corporate Accounting Manager Abbey Rodman. Mr. Lehman was pleased to report there was nothing unusual in the audit findings for the agency's fiscal report, noting no significant deficiencies, material weaknesses or instances of fraud. Ms. Rodman summarized the CAFR document, providing snapshots of the Prince George's and Montgomery County Administration, Parks, and Enterprise funds.

Chair Anderson and Vice-Chair Hewlett thanked the presenters for the report, pleased that the Audit was positive.

  - 1. Introduction of the 2020 Diversity Council (Chiang-Smith/Bennett) Combined with item 2.
  - 2. Certificates of Appreciation for 2019 Diversity Council (Chiang-Smith/Bennett) Executive Director Chiang-Smith introduced the incoming and outgoing Diversity Councils and thanked them for their service. Commissioners added their appreciation. Ms. Bennett, who served as the Acting Executive Director for 2019, was unable to attend to the Commission meeting.
  - 3. 2019 Diversity Council Year-end Report (Weiss/Black/Bush) 2019 Diversity Council Chair Weiss and Vice Co-Chair Black presented the Diversity Council's 2019 Annual review of accomplishments including development and adoption of a Strategic Plan, diversity council outreach, communications and programs. Vice Cochair Bush discussed upcoming events planned for 2020, including Women's History Month, the One-Commission Diversity Event and "Unconscious Bias" Training.

Chair Anderson shared that he encouraged greater training on unconscious bias training and wanted to learn how this training will be rolled out to departments. Commissioner Cichy recommended that the Diversity Council participate in any upcoming legislative receptions where it may be beneficial to share the agency's commitment on diversity. General Council Gardner will keep Commissioners apprised of any developments on a new event.

### e) Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for Fiscal Year 2020 (Kroll)

The Commission received its 34<sup>th</sup> consecutive award for its budget report from the National GFOA, for excellence in reporting and transparency. Corporate Budget Manager Kroll invited the M-NCPPC's cross-departmental budget team to join him to be recognized for the GFOA Award.

### f) Montgomery Planning Project Update (Wright)

Montgomery Planning Director Gwen Wright introduced Deputy Planning Director Robert Kronenberg and noted Deputy Director Tanya Stern was currently working offsite. Director Wright and Deputy Director Kronenberg presented the update to Montgomery County's General Plan Update – *Thrive Montgomery 2050*.

The update presented three major components/goals:

- Community Equity
- Economic Health
- Environmental Resilience

This project has an extraordinary amount of outreach, with multiple events held in every part of the county to inform everyone about the project and get their input. The project included an advertising campaign including images and ads at Metro stations and bus signs. Surveys asking provocative questions to think beyond day to day issues and take a broad look to the future. Particular effort was made to reach out to communities who usually do not participate in the planning effort, including making inroads to ethnic media – Spanish and Chinese language newspapers, and translating information into multiple languages. The website can be downloaded into different languages.

The department is taking all feedback, grouping comments into categories to create *Thrive Montgomery 2050 Top Issues Report*, to cover complete communities, connectedness, diverse economies, safe and efficient travel, affordability, healthy and sustainable environment, diverse and adaptable growth, and culture and design. Director Wright added the department is examining how to address the issues with new policies and actions.

Director Wright and Deputy Director Kronenberg described other ongoing projects that help achieve the three major goals of *Thrive Montgomery 2050*. Future projects include the Silver Spring Master Plan; the White Flint 10-year Check Up; the Ashton Village Plan; and the Fairland Minor Master Plan.

Director Wright commended her staff, for a tremendous job on this major project and invited Commissioners to ask questions.

Commissioner Cichy asked about the acquisition of surplus property for transportation and how that might be expanded into housing. Director Wright said the department is pursuing the possibility as part of the housing initiative. The department is looking at all possibilities. including public lands acquired for transportation. Commissioner Cichy said this could be a great asset and suggested broadening the Transit Oriented Development zones to include transportation land acquisition.

Commissioner Doerner commented on financing of small, 2-4 or 6-10 unit housing properties is very difficult because of the multiple add-ons and pricing layers, versus financing on single-unit or medium to large 10+ or 50+ unit properties. He asked for any additional

information the department might have on financing incentives, saying it would be helpful to encourage the growth of those properties.

### Investment Monitoring Group - Report of December 17, 2019 Meeting

In October 2019, Eaton Vance requested permission to include Agency Credit Risk Transfer Securities (CRTs) in the eligible investment universe. Eaton Vance believes an allocation to CRTs would provide the portfolio with improved diversification and exposure to areas of the U.S. economy with better credit fundamentals. The Investment Monitoring Group (IMG) reviewed Eaton Vance's proposed changes to the investment guidelines with Wilshire Associates' (Wilshire), Brad Baker, who recommended approval of the revised investment guidelines to permit inclusion of a maximum of 5% in CRTs.

**ACTION:** MS. CHIANG-SMITH made a motion, seconded by VICE CHAIRMAN

CICHY to Approve the Revised Investment Guidelines for Eaton Vance to Permit Inclusion of a Maximum of 5% in CRTs. The motion PASSED

unanimously (10-0). (Motion #20-02)

On November 21, 2019, C.S. McKee informed the ERS of an expected sale to CSM Advisors, LLC, an affiliate of North Square Investments. C.S. McKee is being rebranded as CSM Advisors, LLC and is requesting the ERS consent to the assignment of their Investment Management Agreement to CSM Advisors, LLC to continue receiving investment advisory services. C.S. McKee manages approximately 6% of the ERS' fixed income portfolio.

In a Memorandum dated December 17, 2019, Wilshire recommended retention of C.S. McKee (CSM Advisors, LLC) as a core fixed income manager. The IMG and Wilshire's Brad Baker expressed concerns about the backing by Estancia Capital, a private equity fund, and eventual exit strategy for Estancia Capital; pressure to grow assets; loss of focus and/or taking more risk; and a change to the investment strategy.

MS. MORGAN-JOHNSON recommended developing a Watch List Policy and placing CSM Advisors, LLC on watch with frequent in-person performance reviews to the IMG.

ACTION: MR. ZIMMERMAN made a motion, seconded by MS. CHIANG-SMITH

to Approve C.S. McKee's Request to Consent to the Assignment of the Investment Management Agreement to CSM Advisors, LLC, and to place CSM Advisors, LLC on watch. The motion PASSED unanimously

Recommendation for Appointment of PGIM as a new Investment Manager

for the Employees' Retirement System

### RECOMMENDATION

On behalf of the Board of Trustees ("Board") of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission ("Commission") Employees' Retirement System (ERS), I recommend the Commission approve PGIM as a new investment manager for the ERS.

### BACKGROUND AND EVALUATION

At its July 9, 2019 meeting, the Board approved a new asset allocation that includes a dedicated 5% (approximately \$50 million) allocation to Emerging Market Debt (EMD). EMD is a fixed income sub-asset category that comprises bonds issued by less developed, or "developing", countries. The main rationales for investing in EMD is emerging market economies are generally faster growing than developed, have favorable demographics, and have comparatively lower debt obligations. Investing in EMD started in the 1980's and has continued to grow with increased liquidity and credit quality. Spreads on investment grade EMD compare favorably to developed market investment grade credit and below investment grade EMD provides an elevated pick up relative to U.S. high yield. In general, EMD comes in Hard Currency (i.e. \$, €, £, ¥), and Local Currency of issuer. The Board's investment consultant, Wilshire Associates (Wilshire), recommended the emerging market allocation include a blend of Hard (80%) and Local (20%) Currency.

Wilshire completed a manager search and selected candidates with certain criteria, including institutional quality managers with a verifiable track record to a diversified or blended EMD benchmark; a manager with dedicated risk management systems and tools; a manager with competitive terms, including fees and fund structure; a firm highly rated by Wilshire; and a minority or emerging strategy. The search process included a universe of approximately 150 managers.

PGIM, Payden & Rygel, and TCW presented to the Board at its December 3, 2019 meeting. The Board awarded the \$50 million EMD mandate to PGIM. The mandate is a 5% dedicated allocation and is subject to successful negotiation of the Investment Management Agreement.

FY21 Spending Affordability Guidelines for Montgomery County

On Tuesday, February 11, 2020, the Montgomery County Council approved the Spending Affordability Guidelines for the operating budget for FY21.

These guidelines project a 7.5% reduction from the proposed budget, or approximately \$11.3M in Montgomery County funded departmental budgets, including the MC funded portion of the bi-county departments. By comparison, last year's SAG reduction was 5% (\$6.5M).

The amount of the required reduction may change with the release of the County Executive's budget on March 15<sup>th</sup>.

I am presenting this information to the full Commission for two reasons:

- Reductions that may be proposed for the bi-county departments will undoubtedly impact the Prince George's County side of the Commission as well; and
- Equally important, the magnitude of these suggested reductions may result in other spill-over effects to the full Commission.

I would like to point out that, unlike past years, we have not yet been able to identify any Commission-wide savings that could be applied. And, further, the desire expressed in the recent department heads' meeting to accelerate the completion of the reclassification project may well result in the need for a larger compensation marker than that currently in the proposed budget.

Although recent history suggests that the fiscal picture of Montgomery County may be shown to improve in the next month, given the size of the reduction at this time it may be appropriate to begin developing our options now. Toward that end, the MC Planning Board is scheduled to begin this discussion at tomorrow's Planning Board meeting.








### 2. Time and Attendance Management System (Kronos) - October 2019 - December 2019

Our Time and Attendance System has gone through several improvements since it was upgraded in February 2019. The upgrade enabled the digitization's and automation of Employee Personnel Actions and paved the way for us develop a solution that takes Seasonal Employee Payroll for a full paper-based process to a fully digitized and automated. This improvement will reduce errors, save time, free support staff at the department and the HR Backoffice to turn their attention to other important matters; and save trees as well.

### ServiceNow Service Portal


Corporate IT will be rolling out ServiceNow help Desk Portal by September of this year. One of the biggest benefits of adopting ServiceNow is its integration capabilities. Integration is essential to enabling business automation. Currently support to core business systems (Payroll, HR, Finance, Benefits, etc.) is requested through email. This approach has many limitations - emails may get overlooked, lost at times, not trackable, lack of visibility, hard to provide service metrics on, etc.

Several key benefits make migrating to a modern IT service management solution such as ServiceNow a worthwhile:

- ✓ Better visibility of IT service issues and available solutions (through Knowledge Base).
- ✓ The ability to automate routine service tasks, freeing IT staff to focus on more complex problems.
- ✓ An ongoing process of improvement, ensuring that IT capabilities keep up with increasingly complex technology needs.

Together, these benefits enable more streamlined, more responsive IT operations, resulting in less downtime, reduced costs, and a team empowered to be a true and responsive partner.

SUBJECT: MFD Purchasing Statistics— First Quarter FY20

The Commission's procurement policy (Practice 4-10, Purchasing) includes an antidiscrimination component which assures that fair and equitable vendor opportunities are made available to minority, female or disabled owned firms (MFDs). This program is administered jointly by the Office of the Executive Director and the Purchasing Division and includes a price preference program and an MFD subcontracting component based on the Commission procurement practices and the available MFD vendors in the marketplace. The price preference program has been suspended until a MFD study is conducted to provide evidence that the price preference is/is not needed. This report is provided for your information and may be found on the Commission's intranet.

Some of the observations of this FY20 report include:

- Attachment A indicates that through the first quarter of FY20, the Commission procured approximately \$23.2 million in goods, professional services, construction and miscellaneous services. Approximately 16.7% or \$3.9 million was spent with minority, female and disabled (MFD) owned firms.
- Attachment B indicates that in the first quarter MFD utilization was 16.7%.
- Attachment C represents the MFD participation by type of procurement. The MFD participation for construction through the first quarter of FY20 was 27.3%. Attachment C also indicates that the largest consumers of goods and services in the Commission are the Prince George's County Department of Parks and Recreation and the Montgomery County Department of Parks. These programs significantly impact the Commission's utilization of MFD firms. The MFD cumulative utilization numbers for these departments through the first quarter are 21.8% and 7.0%, respectively.
- Attachment D presents the FY20 activity for the Purchase Card program totaling approximately \$4.1 million of which 1.3% was spent with minority, female and disabled (MFD) firms. The amount of procurement card activity represents approximately 17.6% of the Commission's total procurement dollars. One reason for lower MFD participation on the purchase card is that the cards are used with national retail corporations when a

quick purchase for a maintenance job is needed. The purchase cards are also used for training registration in order to guarantee attendance.

- Attachment E portrays the historic MFD participation rates, and the total procurement from FY 1991 to First Quarter FY20.
- Attachments F & G shows the MFD participation in procurements at various bid levels to determine if MFD vendors are successful in obtaining opportunities in procurements that require informal bidding and formal bidding. Based on the department analysis, MFD vendors do appear to be participating, at an overall rate of 12.7% in informal (under \$30,000) and 19.4% in the formal (over \$30,000) procurements. For transactions under \$10k, MFD participation is 9.7%. MFD vendors are participating at an overall rate of 10.1% in transactions over \$250,000.
- Attachment H presents the total amount of procurements and the number of vendors by location. Of the \$23.2 million in total procurement, \$10.6 million was procured from Maryland vendors. Of the \$3.9 million in procurement from MFD vendors, \$3.3 million was procured from MFD vendors located in Maryland.
- Attachment I compares the utilization of MFD vendors by the Commission with the
  availability of MFD vendors. The results show under-utilization in the
  following categories: African American, Asian, Native American, Hispanic and Females.
  The amount and percentage of procurement from MFD vendors is broken out
  by categories as defined by the Commission's Anti-Discrimination Policy. The
  availability percentages are taken from the most recent State of Maryland disparity
  study dated June 25, 2018.
- Attachments J and K are prepared by the Department of Human Resources and Management and show the amount and number of waivers of the procurement policy by department and by reason for waiver. Total waivers were approximately 2.0% of total procurement.



#### Waiver Reason Definitions:

#### Emergency:

Sudden and unforeseeable circumstance have arisen which actually or imminently threaten the continuance of an essential operation of the Commission or which threaten public health, welfare or safety such that there is not enough time to conduct the competitive bidding.

#### Required by Law or Grant:

Public law or the terms of a donation/grant require that the above noted vendor be chosen.

#### Amendment:

A contract is already in place and it is appropriate for the above noted vendor to provide additional services and/or goods not within the original scope of the contract because the interested service and/or goods are uniquely compatible with the Commission's existing systems and patently superior in quality and/or capability than what can be gained through an open bidding process.

#### Sole Source 4:

It has been determined that:

- #1: The vendor's knowledge and experience with the Commission's existing equipment and/or systems offer a greater advantage in quality and/or cost to the Commission than the cost savings possible through competitive bidding, or
- #2: The interested services or goods need to remain confidential to protect the Commission's security, court proceedings and/or contractual commitments, or


